#### **Inter-Divisional Boxing** Championships

Once more the Gymnasium gave pride of place to one of the term's major sporting activities—the Inter-Divisional Boxing Championships. As each occasion demands, the scene changes from one setting to another in quick succession, namely, Ballroom Dancing, Highland Dancing, to Cinema or Concert Hall, thence to Divine Service on Sundays, and so back to a Gymnasium in a continuing cycle of happenings in "Ganges" life.

It took two weeks of afternoon boxing to complete the one hundred and six bouts, which gave interesting sports periods to boys who would not otherwise have been employed.

No. 1 Gymnasium was filled to capacity on Tuesday at 1645 and 2000, when the Captain, Officers, Ship's Company and Boys under training and a number of civilian boxing enthusiasts assembled to witness the final bouts of the Senior and Junior Boxing Championships. In the first session, Winner and Runner-up Plaques were presented by the Captain (J. F. Whitfeld) and in the second session by Rear Admiral C. 0. Alexander, who also presented Championship Belt to Hawke Division, Senior Winners, and the Boxing Statuette to Blake Division, Junior Winners, and four "Good Loser's" prizes to worthy contestants in the preliminary stages at the end of the evening's programme.

In making the presentations, the Admiral recalled the command of H.M.S. "Ganges" fifteen years ago, when their present Captain was his Training Officer, and expressed his pleasure to be asked to come to witness the boxing and present the prizes.
